# 25TH NATIONAL A.A. ARCHIVES WORKSHOP IN NORTH LITTLE ROCK, AR

## HOW WE GOT HERE

Prior to the birth of the National AA Archives Workshop, most Alcoholics Anonymous archivists had little or no information on how to fulfill their service commitment. Often boxes were passed down from the previous archivist to the newly appointed or elected Archivist. Sometimes these boxes had been in the trunks of cars or stashed in homes. The advice was to take classes or work with a conservator in a museum.

The National Alcoholics Anonymous Archives Workshop ("NAAAW") began in 1996 with a Workshop held in Akron, Ohio at the Mayflower Hotel. The Workshop grew out of the desire of a group of Archivists to have a Workshop for the Archivists operating within the General Service, Intergroup, and Institutions structures. These Archivists are found all across North America as well as the rest of the world. We take our inspiration from the first General Service Archivist, Nell Wing (a non-alcoholic), and all of the subsequent General Service Office Archivists.

The founders of our workshop saw the need and took the initiative. Now we have our annual workshop dedicated to the instruction of archival techniques such as: restoration, preservation and de-acidification. There are hands-on workshops, historical presentations, long-timer panels and key-note speakers who share their experiences on not only our history, but history in general. We have training and sharing that offers a variety of insights into all areas of archives service. With the development of new technology there are new methods of record keeping, cataloging, and preserving. We are evolving.

The General Service Office's Archives Workbook has been developed. It too is evolving. We not only have some basics but a useful tool. There is help for the archivist who is new and has great intentions but no direction.

## WHERE WE ARE NOW

In early 2020 the Arkansas Area 4 Archives Committee submitted a bid to host The 2022 National A.A. Archives Workshop. The bid was approved and the workshop will be held September 22-25, 2022 at the Wyndham Hotel in downtown North Little Rock, Arkansas.

After the cancellation of the A.A. International Convention in Detroit and the cancellation of the San Antonio Workshop this year we have not met. We are hopeful that 2022 shows us a safe and smooth path back to this important Workshop and we hope to see you there.

# BILL AND LOIS MOVE TO BEDFORD HILLS

On April 11, 1941, the couple spends their first night there. The comfortable shingled, hip-roofed house (right), which they will name Stepping Stones, affords them a measure of privacy for the first time since Alcoholics Anonymous was founded.



# PERU'S INAUGURAL GROUP

After reading in Look magazine about ACE, a treatment for acute alcoholism, Percy N., an American living in Lima, writes to the Alcoholic Foundation asking for its view of the treatment. The Foundation responds by sending him three Alcoholics Anonymous pamphlets. In turn, Percy expresses his wish to become a member and start a group, which he proceeds to do in November 1950.



# THE FIRST ZONAL MEETING

Born of an idea brought forward at the 1978 World Service Meeting, the first zonal service meeting — during which countries share experiences, strengthen unity, and offer help to A.A.s where service structures have yet to be set up takes place in Bogota, Colombia in 1979. Delegates from ten Latin American countries convene in what is called the Ibero-American Service Meeting. Later, this biannual meeting will be called REDELA, a shortened form of Réunion de Las Americas (Meeting of the Americas). Zonal meetings will be launched in Europe in 1981, Asia/Oceania in 1995, and Sub-Saharan Africa in 2003.

## AA'S TRADITION OF SELF-SUPPORT

AA's far-flung Twelfth Step activities, carrying the message to the next suffer, are the very lifeblood of our AA adventure. Without this vital activity, we would soon become anemic; we would literally wither and die.

Nowhere do AA services—worldwide, area, local—fit into our scheme of things? Why should we provide these functions with money? The answer is simple enough. Every single AA service is designed to make, more and better Twelfth Step work possible, whether it be a group meeting place, a central or intergroup office to arrange hospitalization and sponsorship, or the world service Headquarters to maintain unity and effectiveness all over the globe. Though not costly, these service agencies are absolutely essential to our continued expansion—to our survival as a Fellowship. Their costs are a collective obligation that rests squarely upon all of us. Our support of services actually amounts to our understanding on our part that AA must everywhere function in full strength-and that under our Tradition of self-support, we are all going to foot the bill.

We have long known that Alcoholics Anonymous has no need for charitable contributions from any source. Our Fellowship is self-supporting. Neither do AA groups try to meet the rehabilitation



expenses of thousands of newcomers. Long ago we learned that this was impractical. Instead, AA offers to the new person a spiritual way of life that can eliminate the alcohol problem. With this accomplished, the new person, in the company of AA, repairs personal problems—including the financial one. So, AA groups themselves accept no charitable funds—and give none away.

At first glance, this attitude may seem to be hard-nosed, even callous. An immense experience tells us otherwise. Money gifts—as a prerequisite of getting sober are actually worthless when made a function of an AA group. Of course, we see 'AA's primary charity in the Twelfth Step activities of tens of thousands of us as we daily carry the AA message to newcomers. We travel millions of miles; we absent ourselves from business and home. In the aggregate, we layout large sums; As individuals, we do not hesitate to give temporary financial aid to the newcomer, if and when he seems to want sobriety first. Here, then, is money charity aplenty, always given on a very personal, face-to-face basis. And perhaps 'even this cannot be called wholly charitable, since every Twelfth Step effort means a more certain sobriety and added spiritual growth for the sponsor. Both these principles we understand: that AA wants no charity; that we support our own services. We understand—but sometimes we forget.



## A Rewarding Virtual Day of Sharing at G.S.O.

The 2021 Virtual Day of Sharing, held on December 7 and hosted by the General Service Office, brought together 11 recovery fellowships (including Alcoholics Anonymous) to discuss matters of common interest and collective experience. The first Day of Sharing took place in 1991, and there have been several since attended by representatives of Al-Anon and the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD), as well as a "Fellowship Day of Sharing" in 2008 that included attendees from Debtors Anonymous (D.A.), Overeaters Anonymous (O.A.) and Narcotics Anonymous (N.A.). This was the first Day of Sharing held since December 2019 (after which the pandemic intervened) and was the first ever held virtually.

G.S.O. General Manager Bob W. kicked off the meeting of like-minded organizations by talking about the importance of cooperation between Twelve Step fellowships and how inspiring he found it to be. "We all share these principles," he said. "Each one of these organizations has its own singleness of purpose and we all have the spiritual foundation of anonymity."

The meeting was organized and chaired by Craig W., staff member on the Group Services desk. Part of Craig's work involves cooperating throughout the year with other Twelve-Step fellowships, answering queries, and sharing information. He calls the Day of Sharing "one of the best experiences I've had in A.A. One member to another, sharing what our organizations are, what they do and don't do. It was so powerful to learn how much we have in common."

The 2021 Virtual Day of Sharing was the largest ever held (see box), with 19 representatives of the various fellowships coming together.
